



Stormwater Program Empowered Communities; Local Leaders to Integrate Stormwater, Transportation, Parks, and Housing Infrastructure Programs

West Region



Overview

Across Los Angeles County, local leaders and residents are joining together to shape how the region invests public money related to stormwater and other infrastructure programs. The Safe Clean Water Program will invest about \$285 million per year in stormwater capture projects across the county for water resilience and better water supply, water quality, and community benefits focused on underserved communities, employment, and job training. The Safe Clean Water Program is one of several local public financing programs to create healthier neighborhoods and a better quality of life for residents—all together, there will be nearly \$1.3 billion annually in new public funding for water, transportation, parks, and housing.

Notable Features

- The program integrates water, housing, and transportation projects. County supervisors are finding ways to integrate multiple infrastructure funding projects to optimize workforce development and job training, outreach and education programs, technical assistance, and various policies.
- It empowers local decision-making. Established neighborhood watershed committees review proposed projects and develop an annual investment plan, including funding for community-level coordination capacity.
- It includes labor agreements for large projects, creating room for local hiring for small projects. Funding also supports local workforce job training, which will provide certification classes and vocational training at the

- community level for the design, construction, inspection, operation, and maintenance of projects.
- It monitors progress transparently. The program launched a website to help community members learn about Safe Clean Water Program projects, benefits, and expenditures.
